THE STORY OF MY 1948 FORD PILOT

I've owned old cars since I was a teenager. In fact, I bought my first car when I was 14 – it was a 1938 Morris bakers van which I paid £4 for. I've also had Austin's, old Holden's including an FJ Holden, two 1955 Customlines and Falcons. But I have always liked Ford Pilots, and I've had a few of them over the years since I was about 15 years old.

In 1976, I found the Pilot in a fellow's shed in Burwood, NSW. He had owned the car for years but hadn't driven it for ten years or more, so I made an offer to buy it. And he accepted the offer of \$200 and I brought the car home the following day.

It took a lot of work to get it running properly but eventually I did and then registered it with the original number plates still on the car. At the time, I had two other Pilots which at best, were parts cars. So after getting parts off these cars, I sold the rest to a young bloke in North Queensland who came down to Sydney with his truck and trailer and hauled them back home. In general, I've never had a problem finding parts for the Pilot as they were always able to be sourced.

My particular car has a built in jacking system called a 'Jack-All System' which was an

accessory at the time of purchase. I am reconditioning the system at the moment and shortly it will be fitted back on the car. There are very few Pilots in the country with this system fitted.

The car has been repainted over the years as the original colour was a horrible beige/brown, so I picked another paint that was lighter – a Holden paint. It's also been re-upholstered but I have tried to keep the Pilot as original as I can. Years ago I rebuilt the engine and gearbox and the car has travelled many thousands of includina miles to numerous National meets and countless intra state rallies. Actually, I took it to the first National Meet and it has never missed one National meet since. I did most of the maintenance over the years myself but have recently had help from a few good mates both from the Club and elsewhere.




TRUNK OR TREAT

We will need to pay taxes in 2025 on the 2024 income from the swap meet, likely we will owe \$4,000 to \$5,000 (approximately). We can offset that by donating to Shoreline Community Foundation as a qualified charity. Bill asked if we could find out from the Tech program what they are doing with the donated money. Bob mentioned that Mac Tools might match our donation for tools for the shop or to support scholarships.

Elmo made a motion to give Shoreline Community Foundation the \$2000 donation, Chris seconded the motion. Motion passed unanimously.

Swap Meet

Dave White is on board to help with the swap meet. Bill Meade met with Dave talking about the swap meet. Dave is willing to participate, may call Bob regarding a logo using his car for the swap meet logo for t-shirts and such. Price is \$55 until March 1st, then after that it is \$60.

Elmo suggested we talk to the fairgrounds to re-line the fire lanes. Lining out the stalls for volunteer parking is also an issue.

Vendor tags were mentioned as an issue. A \$20 fee for an extra tag was suggested. The DOT lot is expensive with fees and percentages. 1 vendor parking per stall. Should be in the vendor paperwork.

A suggestion to include a second club to help manage the swap meet. The liability is a concern for smaller clubs. Bill mentioned offering to another V8 Club first, then we would need to decide the percentage split. The amount of responsibility would be a key determinant.

We need to get started ASAP to order printing and such.

We need to pay the \$1500 up-front fee to the fairgrounds soon and set the firm date.
