


# **History of Twin Cities Ford Assembly Plant**

Bruce Nelson, the past president of the EFV-8 national club gave an informational PowerPoint program about the history of the Twin Cities Ford Assembly Plant in Highland Park, St. Paul, MN, from its beginning in 1924 to its end in 2011. 

# History of Twin Cities Ford Assembly Plant Continues here

Ford chose the site of the plant because of the source of power available from the Mississippi River. Albert Kahn, the renowned architect who designed other Ford structures, designed the 8.5M square foot plant on a bluff next to the river. His design incorporated large windows facing the river and spectators could observe the assembly line in operation from outside. Another Kahn feature were the skylights that ran the length of the plant. Construction of the \$10 million plant was started in 1924. Indiana limestone was used on the façade. Wooded floors were used throughout. Two rail lines serviced the building.

The hydroelectric plant, which was built first, provided so much electricity that Ford was able to sell excess back to the grid.

The plant went into operation in May 1925, producing Model T's. There was an increase in rail rates, so Ford had an elevator installed to provide access to a tunnel that led to the river so that finished cars could be loaded onto a barge!

Beneath the plant was a repository of silica sand that Ford mined to use in the glass plant he had built in 1925. There were over three miles of tunnels 100 feet beneath the factory. The tunnels still exist to-day!

Remember, these funds allow us to pay for items like our picnic & Tour of the Year as well as donations to automotive student needs. Believe it or not it is almost St. Patrick's parade time. Last year it was a beautiful day and very well could be this year as well. I am sure this will be discussed in length at the meeting, but if you have any questions about participating or just coming down and cheering for the fine Fords (and DeLoreans) let us know. Dave presented a banner with Vendor Swap Meet Entrance Requirements. They will be on the fences at the meet. He also presented a "Vendor Assist Tag" This gives someone a pass to assist the vendor but can't park. These are \$40 and allow parking in DOT lot. He presented the cost of the Swap Meet yearly. We buy a pallet of Lyme and can't return any.

We have 707 spots held, 435 already paid.

Sent third email last week.

Everyone got postcards and postcards.

Web site is set up with PayPal check out system.

Car Corral: Whidbey Island Cruisers have agreed to do the volunteer work there.

We need help with Vendor Parking

Stall Map:

Most is the same except we have 608 (Pygmy Goat Barn)

610 (Dairy Barn) is available as well.

He contacted someone with tractors – they will take 10 stalls – we have 2 groups of 5 on 2 corners for now. We will have parts pickup, parking and trailer parking will be well designated.

\$40 to sell the car noon Friday to 2:00 Sunday. Parking in Red Parking is \$15 – all money goes to fairgrounds. We pay 25% of gross sales of stalls, so this is acceptable. Yellow parking is handicap and vendor handicap.

DOT lot is north of the Monroe Coop. - we will not use this lot now, we will make up the money using the vendor assist tags.

Sno-Isle TECH, we usually make a presentation to the classes (morning and afternoon). He brings 20 kids to the Swap Meet.

Contract is signed and insurance binder is done.

Police will be there Saturday.

Area Captains are set up, though they may need a couple more to help in some areas.



# History of Twin Cities Ford Assembly Plant Continues here



Tunnels 100' beneath the glass plant to mine silica sand.


In 1927, a bridge that connected the two cities was built just north of the plant. Officially known as the Intercity Bridge, the bridge is more commonly known as the Ford Bridge.

The northwest corner of the building housed a beautiful showroom where the latest models were displayed. Alberts Kahn's classic design featured carved stone details, ornate light fixtures, and expensive windows.

The plant was closed in 1933 and 1934 during the Great Depression. And the first million car to leave the assembly line occurred in 1937!

During WWII, the Twin Cities plant manufactured T-17 and M8 medium armored cars, plus pistons and oil pumps for Pratt & Whitney R-2800 aircraft engines.

Of interest is that the plant assembled the Sportsman Convertible, among other passenger cars. The plant switched over to assembling F-150 pickup trucks in 1978. In 1983, Twin Cities began assembling Ranger pickups, of which six million were produced.

Because of the dwindling sales of the Ranger, combined with the plant's biggest drawback – inability to produce its own large sheet metal parts – the plan was to close the plant in 2006. However, the closure date was extended to 2011, when the plant was closed for good. At the time of closure, it was Ford's oldest plant.

Bruce Nelson and three others formed a group call "Ford Legacy of Minnesota" to help preserve the history of the plant. They met with the Ford people to help save the artifacts, though without much success. Bruce and his friends persisted, however, and now the original striking limestone façade along with the art deco exterior building lights were saved and are presently in storage. The Ford archives in Dearborn hauled away all the records and office files.

Demolition of the 2.1 million square foot facility began in 2013. Only the steam plant was saved, as it is on the National Registry. After a massive environmental cleanup operation, the 122 acre site was sold to a developer for \$64 million, with the exception of the underground mineral rights, which Ford retained. Plans have been approved to build a multiuse housing and retail site known as the "Highland Bridge" development. Sadly, Ford history is not recognized as part of the venture! A search for Highland Park, St. Paul on Google Earth shows the site and the hydroelectric power plant and the steam plant.

Sales:

Paul made a significant deposit – we have 435 spots sold with 707 reserved until March 1<sup>st</sup>. 604 is nearly sold out from returning vendors. Currently 216 were not previously sold.

Club Booth will be in the 600 building. (Promoting club).

Club Booth for sales will be in the regular spot.

Paul handed out flyer mock-ups to hand out at the promotion's booth. Amy also had business cards created in a manner that members can affix their own information as needed when handing them out.

Paul printed out National registration forms – those who sign up must have both National and Local membership. (Should have V8 Times available to browse through).

Bob suggested having one of our cars at the promotions booth to draw attention to the booth.

## Car Corral:

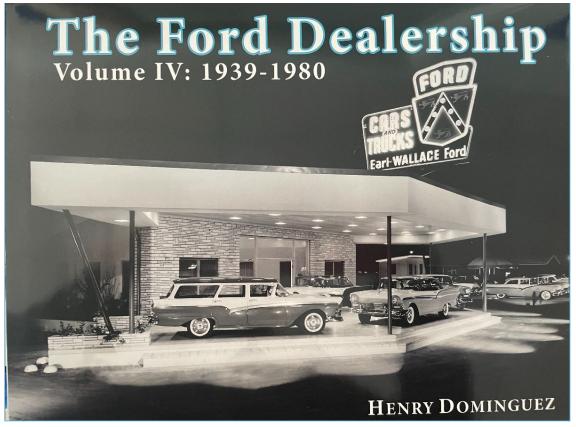

#### Treasurer:

Bob brought a financial report. Report can be requested through Bob Merz.

Report included swap meet checking and savings, club checking and savings and Certificate of Deposit.

Bob brought the Insurance Certificate for the Swap Meet – Paul is in possession: May need to get a new certificate prior to Swap Meet due to deadlines.

He presented a Profit and Loss statement for 2024. We had some expenses that are dependent upon the Swap Meet income, and we need to think about the future of the club should we end the Swap Meet.

Meeting adjourned 2:00pm




